A "Giraffe" Hand for you !

"Some of us wrestled with this hand at a recent tournament. We asked the experts to help us!

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Extreme "giraffe" hands like this always attract a lot of interest and, for that reason, yes I think it would be a good idea to write it up in the newsletter. My bridge encyclopaedia gives the probability of picking up any 8 5 0 0 distribution as 0.0031 (or 1 hand in 322), and specifically with 8 spades and 5 hearts as 0.0003 (or 1 hand in 3,333). So you should expect to play an average of over 12 x 26-board bridge sessions before picking up an 8-5-0-0 (any order), or 128 bridge sessions before you expect on average to pick up a long-necked giraffe with 8-long spades and 5-long hearts.

My first reaction is to open it with your strong bid - e.g. 2C. Having the boss suit spades, and obviously being willing to compete to 5S or even 6S I think largely negates the need to pre-empt. Also if you pre-empt 6S, how would you feel if your partner shows up with a few hearts to the Q or A plus a void in spades? Also, this unexpected extreme shape probably gives you a good chance of advantageously buying a double from the opps at the 5 or 6-level - they will never expect you to have two voids!

I think it unlikely NS will bid onto 7 of a minor as a sacrifice, vulnerable vs not. Arguably it's wrong for them to do that anyway (if they were to find the killing opening lead of a trump).

On the actual hand I doubt that the auction commencing 2C followed by bidding S and getting support from partner is very likely to increase the chance of South on lead finding the killing opening lead of a trump. South has two Aces to choose from and, presuming partner has had a chance to show the minors in the auction somehow, he or she is most likely to lead one of the off-suits. Cheers! **Alan Grant**

And now from Nigel.

Lots of interesting issues...

1. I would open 1S. A lot is going to depend on partner's heart holding and I will find out about that more easily after opening 1S. My style is to not open 2C unless I have quite a lot of high card strength and defence.
2. After 1S-X-2S it is an interesting problem for North. I think you want to at least invite slam, for example by bidding 3S followed by 4NT or 5C. But just blasting 6C is very tempting.
3. Once West has raised, I would always be willing to bid up to 6S if forced with the East hand, mostly as a sacrifice but with some chance of making. Against good opponents you should probably just bid 6 immediately but against random people in a multi-grade I would just let them keep pushing me. They could easily double 5S and the main goal on these hands is to be declarer.
4. South should pass 6S if N/S are in a force, which they would be if North started with 3S. Otherwise South should double. The trump lead is very obvious - it's hard to construct any layout where another lead would work better.

Suggested auction: 1S-X-2S-6C-6S-X. **Nigel Kearney**
