Kia Ora koutou:

It has been good that we are increasingly able to play at the club as covid cases have been dropping. Return of face-to-face bridge



We welcome a full return of face-to-face bridge this week which coincides with the government's announcement of the dropping of the traffic light system. That decision will make it much easier for clubs like ours to plan and operate.

Players will not need to pre-register for the Wednesday's Woe Wilson Memorial Handicap Pairs. Just find a partner and turn up. While the club has a clear preference for face-to-face bridge, obviously online bridge is here to stay. A subcommittee is still working through the details of how we incorporate it into our club structure.

Peter Newell, one of the Expert Volunteers has jotted down a few tips for improving your play

- 1. Listen to the auction think about how many points partner and declarer are likely to have and their lengths in suits during the auction to inform your opening lead.
- 2. After the opening lead, think about the auction again after having seen dummy and the opening lead this should help you inform your play as a declarer or as a defender.
- 3. After the opening lead and the sight of the dummy, take your time as declarer before playing from dummy to plan the play, and as defender as to what you think declarer is going to do, and what to play. What declarer plays should give you clues as to their hand.
- 4. When bidding don't bid your values twice, for example, if you have shown a 5 card suit it is rarely right to bid it again unless you have no other option, or if you preempt and your partner passes don't bid again.
- 5. Try and keep things simple in the bidding unless you are confident that you and your partner are on the same wavelength.
- 6. Try and make it easy for your partner by signalling clearly.
