### Editorial

She referenced the University of Stirling research (noted above) that showed playing bridge alongside other brain activities such as crosswords can help stave off brain decay.

The Stirling study revealed playing bridge keeps people smarter, happier and more social into old age. The study also indicated that people who play bridge have higher levels of wellbeing than those who don't. In addition, the game and its social environment has the potential to maintain good health, through increased positive cognitive, social and quality of life outcomes.

About 15 titles are still to be located and Inspector Poirot is on the case. Some of these titles may have been borrowed without an entry being made in the issues book. One certainly has. Klinger's 'Bridge Conventions, Defences and Countermeasures' can't be found. We know it was back on the shelves at end of January but now it is on the missing list. If you have it please put it back.

It's been a popular book but there are others available that cover conventions in a comprehensive way. Brian Senior's 'Conventions Today' is recommended. He points out the strengths and weaknesses of the most popular conventions relative to the alternatives available. He's a good, clear writer. Two of his pamphlets, on fourth suit forcing, and on balancing, are so in our library. How do you treat the 1C, 1D; 1H, 1S sequence? What about an 11-15 HCP's 1NT in the balancing position after 1C and two passes? If you use a wide ranging 1NT, 'Conventions Today' has some suggestions for the next round of bidding. You don't have to read about bridge to be a good bridge player but it can add to the enjoyment.

The three titles above are all part of the Dougal McLean bequest. His collection and other titles gifted and purchased recently have made a huge difference to our library. So take a look and borrow a book but make sure you use the issues book correctly and return the borrowed book as soon as you have finished with it.

### Ensure you enter and arrive on time

It was only by luck that a team wasn't sent home when the Open Andrew Thompson Memorial Teams event started. One team thought the team was entered, but hadn't, while another hadn't entered. Luckily there was an even number of teams but it did create a major hassle for the directors which is why everyone was kept waiting while the scoring system was rejigged. Similarly, don't think you are too important for the directors to refuse you entry if you are not seated by 7.20pm as required. The directors have been given their riding instructions so don't moan that you weren't warned!

### Planning and inferences on hand shape – Nigel Kearney

At the Hutt Multigrade on March 3 I picked up this hand. LHO opened 1D, Tegan doubled and RHO passed.

I chose to respond 2H to the takeout double. This shows values (around 8-11) and is not forcing. It's perfectly ok to do this with a four card suit because partner's double promises at least three hearts, or a strong hand on which she will bid again. That means we are in at worst a 4-3 fit which is fine at the two level, with the short trump hand able to get a ruff or two. A 1H response would be weaker than this. Tegan raised to 4H and LHO led the three of clubs. This was the dummy:

KQ84

Counting tricks, there are two clubs, and I expect LHO to have the missing aces so I can get one diamond and a spade. That means I will want six tricks from trumps. Maybe I can establish a second spade but the timing for that is awkward because I'll need to draw all the trumps first and entries to my hand are limited.

An important point to consider is that LHO has a minimum opening but did not open a 12-14 1NT. So her hand will not be balanced. That significantly increases the chance of a poor break in either spades or trumps. Also, LHO will have five diamonds unless precisely 4144.

Ruffing two diamonds in dummy looks like the best option. I will need to ruff high twice but I have good trumps in my hand after that. There are some traps to watch out for:

1. I need to get my spade trick as early as possible. When ruffing diamonds I don't want RHO to discard spades and later ruff my king of spades. If RHO is 2425 and LHO 4153, even one diamond ruff before the king of spades is established and cashed could be fatal.
2. I have to lose the lead twice, once in spades and once in diamonds. Assuming opponents will lead back trumps both times, I cannot afford to play even one round myself.
3. If RHO has four trumps, I should ruff a club in hand. Then my AJ10 will be good after two high ruffs in dummy. If I don't ruff a club early enough and RHO started with 97xx I could lose one at the end.

I win in dummy and play a diamond at trick two. LHO takes my king with the ace and leads another club. LHO's carding suggests the club lead was not a doubleton so I win, then ruff a club low and lead a spade to the king which holds. Only now I play another diamond and fortunately RHO follows. At this point I can claim: I have five tricks already plus a high diamond ruff in dummy, heart to my 10, another high ruff, and I will still have the AJ of hearts.

There is nothing fancy in this hand but it illustrates the importance of thinking carefully and having a plan. Plenty of people don't do this as shown by the fact that +620 was worth 97% of the matchpoints.

### Conference for all aspiring bridge teachers
